



eat-in space with lots of room for the family to be together." A cerused oak table pulled up to a banquette in the airy living room is as formal as mealtime gets. "We translated what we designed for them in New York to the light and context of Florida," Bustamante explains. "But we made it more relaxed and very easy to clean—stone floors and sisal rugs—so you don't have to worry about kids messing things up."

Working with a blank concrete-and-glass canvas, Bustamante created lofty spaces that emphasize dazzling ocean views and showcase the couple's extensive collection of photography and contemporary art. In the master bedroom, the brilliant blues of a spectacular Robert Motherwell piece influenced the serene palette: graphic ikat prints on pillows and an upholstered bench, and flowing cornflower-hued curtains that break onto the carpet with just the merest hint of puddling.

In fact, much of the home's clean, monochromatic look has subtle punches of azure and aqua mixed among the dominant

pale grays and whites. "We used cool, fresh colors that bring in a little bit of the sea and are neutral enough to hang art against," explains the designer. He also cleverly finished interior walls so that they had a sense of texture but didn't compete with the main attractions. In the living-dining area, walls covered in smoky raffia and nubbly cream linen highlight a striking triptych by Italian artist Fabrizio Plessi, composed of digital images of a lava-spewing volcano set into jet-black stone slabs. The panels are so heavy that Bustamante perched them atop iron I-beams resting on the floor. "It's such a tough contemporary work," says the designer, "but against the fabric it doesn't feel so cold." In the master bedroom, the Motherwell painting hangs against square panels upholstered in white linen, suggesting a softer version of wood coffers. It's at once casual, elegant, and completely appropriate-exactly what makes this beach escape the easygoing and sophisticated retreat its owners dreamed of.
